THOUGHTS FROM THE MODERATOR

The beginning of the church year starts with the season of Advent from December 1 to Christmas. We have a Thanksgiving service on the evening of November 26, followed by two important events, Advent Sunday, and the Giving Tree.

Advent Sunday, December 8, is our own celebration of Advent/Christmas, decorating the sanctuary in a festive manner with a tree, garlands and more, as well as participating in crafts and conversation with others in our church family. All this follows worship on December 8.

The Giving Tree is our opportunity to reach out to our community with gifts for those who need our help in this time of sharing and giving. We also share our facility with a group of hardworking volunteers who need the space to



organize such a massive undertaking (225 families last year) for our surrounding area. The session regularly has approved the use of our building for this project, since it is such an important outreach in which we participate. We make room for each other.

The combination of Advent Sunday and Giving Tree helps us witness to the fullness of God's gift in the birth of Jesus Christ. One part is our own celebrative joy in receiving the gift. The second part is reaching out to others in love, as God has reached out to us in love. In both, we are representing what it means to be disciples of Jesus Christ, receiving and giving. Welcome each other on December 8 and welcome the Giving Tree's hard workers with joy and an open heart. In so doing we give glory to God. This is our witness to the good news of Christmas!

I thought it would be helpful to give a quick note concerning our pastoral search. Our session and Reedsburg's have finished the necessary paperwork to move on to the pastoral search. We have been laying groundwork so that we might have a good basis for conversation when we have a pastor together. Our information is now online for candidates to see and make inquiries. PERIOD PROJECT

The period project is funded in part by a Healthy Community Partnership Grant from the SSM Health St. Clare Foundation. The purpose of the grant is to provide feminine hygiene products to girls and young women in the Baraboo area, mainly through the Baraboo public schools. This year we assembled 151 bags of products for middle and high school students and 29 bags for elementary aged students. These were given to the Backpack Project to be distributed. We also provide products to the schools as needed throughout the school year.

STEWARDSHIP SEASON

Today, in most churches, November is the month for Stewardship campaigns as well as national election campaigns. Over the years, "stewardship" has taken on various complexions. Our stewardship emphasis this year, 2024, is fashioned after Baraboo's famous circus lore. Its unofficial title is the "Big Colossal." Each Sunday, one member or chairperson of one ministry tells the congregation



about what "big colossal" activities or services that ministry has been involved in during the past year. The Finance Ministry also reminds us that "big colossal" can be in tiny, seemingly



miniscule actions, such as in Jesus' story of the "widow's mite." The purpose, of course, is to encourage the congregation members to prayerfully and generously give.

Pie Sunday was celebrated on Sunday, October 27. Many congregants enjoyed homemade pie and cheesecake after worship in

recognition of sharing "a piece of the pie" this Stewardship Season. Thank you to our Finance Ministry for sharing stories with us every Sunday morning, for baking and donating delicious pies, and for hosting a lovely Fellowship!

OLD-FASHIONED STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN

The three articles on the right of this page illustrate the early "stewardship" campaigns of the 1850s and years following. There were "concerts," primarily for enjoyment but also for the purpose of raising funds. Notice that in the "Simoneands Concert," there is a four-year old drummer and that the price is 25 cents.

Following the concert article there is a "NOTICE" for "renting the slips." This is the term used for "pew" rental. The way a family supported the church was by renting a place to sit. Just think, you could choose a place to sit in the front or in the back. In the 1850s this would have been in the small wooden church building on 2nd Street across from what is now the Civic Center. Of course, visitors were always welcome without a pew charge. Do you think our tendency to sit in the same place or our concern about sitting in someone else's place is left over from this pew renting custom?

Funds from both the concert and the pew rentals most likely went to support the building and the various functions of the church. The third article indicates the method for raising the funds for the pastor's salary. From a pastor's point of view, just imagine opening your home to "friends" to give you a "donation" for your salary or having to attend an honorary afternoon "tea" where monetary "gifts" were being solicited in your behalf? Both methods were practiced.



DON'T STRESS IT!

This time of the year can stressful, and high levels of stress can have a serious impact on your mental and physical health. It's important that you find ways to manage stress. People find different things relaxing, so give some of these a try to see which ones work for you!

- ❖ Watch something funny. Laughter really is the best medicine. It relieves physical tension, reduces stress and increases immunity...so watch your fave comedy and laugh your way to tranquility.
- ❖ Get a Coloring Book. They've exploded in popularity recently and for good reason colouring in helps you chill out because it's very difficult to focus on other things when you're doing it.
- ❖ Breathe 'Pranayama' style. This yoga method requires you to breathe through one nostril at a time (inhale through the left by blocking the right, exhale through the right by blocking the left, repeat for 3 minutes) to relieve stress. Weird but wonderful!
- Go Stargazing. Laying down and watching a starry night is not only awesome but it increases your brain's alpha waves which rapidly enables you to relax. Cool, huh?
- ❖ Take a walk in nature. Not only will walking trigger the release of endorphins which can reduce stress hormones, but being out in nature can boost serotonin levels which can also contribute to an improved sense of well-being.
- Relax your jaw. Release the tension you're carrying in your jaw by opening it wide for a half a minute, breathing through your nose and gently closing it.
- ❖ Write a gratitude list. Unsurprisingly, stressful events can leave us feeling negative and as if we're lacking in some way. But having a greater sense of appreciation for the people and things in your life can really help you gain perspective, feel more positive and enable you to better handle stress. So try writing down 5 things you're thankful for.
- ❖ Don't procrastinate. We've all been there…one minute you're revising, the next minute you're checking out the photos of your friends' mutual friends' friend on facebook (wow, that even sounds as stressful as it is), but all procrastination does is put things off and stops you achieving your goals which only generates more stress!
- Lower your standards. Setting ridiculously high standards for yourself generates anxiety by putting pressure on you to perform and it can make you particularly vulnerable to the damaging effects of emotional stress. Nobody's perfect so try loving and accepting yourself as the great individual you are.
- Listen to calming music. Oh, the power of music! Research suggests that chilled out tunes slow down our pulses, lower blood pressure and decrease stress hormones. So plug in and relax or if no one's listening sing/shout along to release even more tension!
- ❖ Drink more water. Even slight dehydration can lower our moods and it can increase levels of the stress hormone, cortisol. Dehydration can also cause your body to stop functioning properly which can result in anxiety too...so get sipping!


BUILDING AND EQUIPMENT

Often the equipment needed to run our church is overlooked or taken for granted such as the furnace and AC, or the phones and the computers. Today we wanted to highlight the video and sound equipment and the people that know how to operate it. This equipment enriches our weekly church services and then extends those services to worshippers outside our building through television and YouTube broadcasts.

The Covid epidemic profoundly changed our own services. YouTube and the local cable TV station allowed us all to continue worship during the lock-down. After returning to our church building, we continued to broadcast

our Sunday services through Channel 43, the local cable TV station, and through YouTube. We know that many of our housebound members watch the cable service on Sunday morning at 11:00 am. Other folks also view the YouTube videos. We currently have 70 YouTube channel subscribers and average about 25 to 30 views per video. Holiday services can pull over 200 viewers. We also know that more folks watch the cable station weekly than YouTube.

While we have had microphones for more than 25 years, the large LCD screen monitors in the front of the church were installed 3 years ago. These allow us to read scripture and participate in the service more easily. The minister can even show videos and photos. To broadcast our weekly service requires additional equipment and software.



That equipment includes: microphones

with wireless receivers, 2 cameras with controllers, several computers, a video source mixer, a digital recorder, amplifiers, and an MP3 player. The church also needs the software to coordinate all the equipment and then edit and compile the service for broadcast. And none of this comes together without our AV team, those talented church members who handle all these tasks and make it look easy each Sunday. They work before, during and after every Service.

You may not see them but these folks are a very important part of our weekly service. They are Cliff and Deb Nieuwenhuis and Tracy and Kendra Drinkwater. Without their dedication, skill, and knowledge we wouldn't be able to support the sermon or record and broadcast it. They do this as a labor of love, and we are blessed to have them. Please remember to thank them.
